

Yiddish is more than just a language. It is the conduit through which the Jews of eastern Europe expressed the love, fear, hope and humor of their lives. It is the means through which they communicated with God, each other, and, ultimately, with us.

It is not possible for me to listen to Yiddish music and not be constantly aware of the immensity of the loss that the world suffered because of the destruction of this community. Yet paradoxically I am also aware of the seeds of rebirth of eastern European Jewish communities in recent years, the large numbers of students who are now studying Yiddish on the college level, and the wealth of Yiddish culture that we in America have become the inheritors of.

It is perhaps through Yiddish that our people have most eloquently expressed their resilience in the face of oppression and their dogged determination to affirm the sanctity and goodness of life.

In a humorous turn of phrase worthy of the language, Yiddish has been described as a language that has been dying for the last 100 years. Here's hoping that Yiddish will continue living for the next 1000 years.

The Performers

Cantor Charles David Osborne

Cantor Charles David Osborne has achieved international recognition as a singer, conductor and composer. He is a graduate of the Hartt College of Music, and the Cantors Institute of the Jewish Theological Seminary of America.

Cantor Osborne has made numerous appearances as soloist with the Zamir Chorale of Boston, the Zamir Chorale of New York, Selah, the Rottenberg Chorale of New York, Zemer Chai of Washington, D.C., and as a member of Jubal's Lyre. He has appeared on television and radio throughout the United States, Canada, Israel, and worldwide on Monitor Radio. He was a featured performer on "Hallelujah – A Celebration of Psalms", nationally broadcast on the ABC Network, and is heard on WGBH-television's production of "The Jews of Boston".

On recording, Osborne can be heard as a featured soloist on The Western Wind's acclaimed C.D. "The Birthday of the World" (parts 1 and 2), and on the recently released C.D. "To Heal The Earth", which features Cantor Osborne's cantata "A Tree of Life". He has recorded numerous times with the Zamir Chorale of Boston.

Cantor Osborne is the founder and director of KOL RINAH - The Jewish Youth Chorus of Greater Boston.

The Zamir Chorale of Boston

Joshua Jacobson, Director

The Zamir Chorale of Boston is an ensemble specializing in the full spectrum of music arising out of the various Jewish traditions. Since its formation in 1969 the Chorale has remained committed to the highest quality performance of this literature which spans thousands of years, four continents, and a variety of styles, both vernacular and cultivated.

The Zamir's credits are numerous. The Chorale has performed throughout North America, toured Israel and Great Britain, and appeared with the Jerusalem Symphony and Israel Philharmonic orchestras under the batons of Zubin Mehta and Daniel Barenboim. Locally, the chorus has appeared with the New England Conservatory Orchestra and the Pro Arte Orchestra and has performed for the International Society for Contemporary Music, the American Choral Directors Association national conventions and Boston's FirstNight celebrations.

Zamir has received consistent praise in both local and national media; writing in the Boston Globe, Richard Dyer dubbed Zamir "a virtuoso outfit." In 1978 Zamir received the Silver Medallion award for performing excellence from Boston's Association for the Performing Arts, in 1988 the Myrtle Wreath award from the New England region of Hadassah, and in 1992 the Klal Yisrael award from the Synagogue Council of Massachusetts.

Joshua R. Jacobson, founder and director of the Zamir Chorale of Boston, holds a Bachelors degree in Music from Harvard College, a Masters in Choral Conducting from the New England Conservatory, and a Doctor of Musical Arts from the University of Cincinnati. He is Professor of Music and Director of Choral Activities at Northeastern University, where he served for nine years as Chairman of the Department of Music, and currently as the Stotsky Professor of Jewish Studies. He also holds the position of Adjunct Professor of Jewish Music at Hebrew College. He has conducted workshops on choral music for various groups, including the American Choral Directors Association, the American Conference of Cantors and the Zimriyah International

Choral Festival; and has guest conducted a number of ensembles, including the Boston Pops Orchestra and the Boston Lyric Opera Company. He has given lectures on various aspects of music for a number of organizations, including the pre-Symphony lectures sponsored by the Friends of the New England Conservatory. He has also written articles on various aspects of choral music, and compositions and arrangements which have been published and performed throughout the United States as well as in Canada, Europe and Israel. In 1989 he spent four weeks in Yugoslavia as a "Distinguished Professor" under the auspices of the Fulbright program. In 1994 he was awarded the Benjamin Shevach Award for Distinguished Achievement in Jewish Educational Leadership from Hebrew College. Prof. Jacobson is Past President of the Massachusetts chapter of the American Choral Directors Association.

The Boston Kleztet

The Yiddish work *klezmer* is a contraction of the Hebrew "kle" (instrument) and "zemer" (music). Traced back as early as the 16th century, *klezmer* is the traditional dance-oriented music of the Jews of Eastern Europe. The music is a blend of Jewish liturgical and other native folk melodies, including Roumanian, Russian, Ukrainian, Bulgarian, Polish, Hungarian, Arabic and Gypsy. *Klezmorim* (the musicians) provided musical entertainment at many Jewish celebrations, ceremonies and fesitvals.

Drawing from this musical tradition, the Boston Kleztet present an eclectic program of freylachs, shers, waltzes, horas and dontemporary Israeli folk tunes. The band has performed an numerous social and civic parties as well as at charity concerts. The band's musicians include: Joanne Baker (piano and accordian), Alan Alpert (trombone), Sheldon Benjamin (percussion), Harvey Budner (banjo, mandolin and guitar), Dan Kischner (violin), Dan Shaw string bass), Peri Smilow (vocals), and Bill Wise (clarinet).

In real life, the band members hold day jobs that are mostly unrelated to their musical pursuits: Joanne Baker teaches eighth grade English at The Solomon Schechter Day School in Newton, Alan Alpert is a computer professional, Sheldon Benjamin is a neuropsychiatrist, Harvey Budner is a child psychiatrist, Dan Kirschner is a professor of biology at Boston College, Dan Shaw is a pyschiatrist, Peri Smilow is a cantorial soloist and educator, and Bill Wise is Chief of Pathology at Newton-Wellesley Hospital.
