

The Hassidic movement, which began in eighteenth-century Poland, emphasized the power of singing to bring even the unlearned Jew closer to God. The Rabbi of Moditz was especially famous for the music created and sung in his presence. This Hassidic spiritual is sung without lyrics. To the mystics, words were considered to be an impediment to their intimate communion with God.

Barukh El Elyon (Blessed is the Exalted God)

Blessed is the exalted God who gave us respite; For our souls, a relief from disaster and groaning. May He seek out Zion, the desolate city. How long, the grieving for the groaning soul?!

They who keep the Sabbath—men and women alike—Will find God's favor like the offerings in the ancient Temple.

He Who rides on high, the Ruler of the universe, Showed His people, through pleasant songs, How to observe the Sabbath With and all kinds of delicious foods, With dignified garments and a family feast.

Happy are all who await that enhanced gratification From the One who sees all, yet dwells in obscurity. He will grant them a heritage in mountains and valleys, A heritage and a respite like that of our ancestor Jacob, Upon whom the sun shone.
